Text: Euclidean and Transformational Geometry (first edition) by Shlomo Libeskind. Jones and Bartlett.
Materials: You will need an drawing compass and a straightedge. You will use either Geometer's Sketchpad or GeoGebra. Geometer's Sketchpad is installed on the lab computers.

Course Description: Modern treatment of topics from Euclidean geometry with an introduction to other geometries. Appropriate for Elementary or Secondary school mathematics teachers.

Course Objectives: This course will refresh your knowledge of high school geometry and introduce you to more advanced topics in geometry. You will learn to carry out basic and more advanced geometric constructions and you hone your abilities at reading and writing mathematical proofs. In addition you will become familiar to geometric software packages.

Attendance: Attendance is expected everyday.

Calculator Policy: Calculators are *not* allowed on exams.

Notes: During lecture you will be expected to take notes. I will not be using slide presentations or posting my notes online. If you miss a day of class be sure to get notes from a fellow classmate.

Homework: Every Friday you will be assigned homework exercises. Each assignment will be due the following Friday. There will also be some assignments where you are required to use *Geometer's Sketchpad* or *GeoGebra*. You are encouraged to work in groups. However, everyone must turn in their own solutions. **Group Work:** On the first day everyone will be assigned to a group. Occasionally each group will have to present a topic to the class.

Exams: There will be one midterm exam and one final exam. They will be closed book. You are allowed one note card no larger than $3'' \times 5''$ for any notes you can fit on it. Make up exams will only be given in exceptional circumstances and will require prior approval of the instructor. In emergency situations (medical, etc.), a note from a physician will be required. If absences at exams are not adequately documented, the student will receive 0 points. *There will be NO make-up final exam*.

Exam Dates:

- Midterm Exam: Friday November 6th, in class.
- Final Exam: Friday December 18th (3:00 5:00 pm).

Holidays: There will be two days during the semester where there is no class. The first is Labor day on September 7th. The second is during Thanksgiving break on November 27.

Grading: The overall course grade will be determined from homework assignments, group presentations, one midterm exam and a comprehensive final exam. Grades will be determined in the following way:
